Gliding into the wall to start the last two lengths I saw the deep breath. A big push, pull and I immediately knew she was going to just swim all out. The turnover was quicker, the kick was harder, she hit her best pace and pulled away. For a second, silence, a few murmurs and everyone knew this heat was over.







The last turn, her best. That arm came over and the dig for home. I could see her look over at the lane to her left to see another swimmer on her shoulder. A bigger kick and long stroke, a breath, and another look and she knew it was a lapped swimmer. A few strong arm strokes and she was at the wall with a two hand touch. I knew she was not going to have that pad not record her time!!!

Immediately up and looking at the timer she asked for her time. With great enthusiasm the timer expounded "Great Swim, 3:49!!!"

By now Linette did a big arm lift and slide out of the pool. No going under the ropes to the end ladder where the old folks get out. Cap off and goggles in hand she said, "I could have gone ten seconds faster!"

A personal best by 13 seconds faster from when she qualified to go to Albuquerque! Three years older and 13 seconds faster. The smile was priceless!

She did her best but the timing and turn held her back from getting a personal best and finishing 18th out of 28 in her age group.

Day three looked to be her comeback day as she warmed up to swim the 100 yard freestyle. A cool morning and early swim had our spirits up.

Another good start for her at the BEEEEP! Taking it out smooth all looked good. However a poor fist turn and she was off the leaders pace. Try as she might her energy was gone from two days of sitting, waiting and hotel bed discomfort. Not a bad swim but not a personal best with a finish of 13th out of 18 swimmers in her age group. This was one of the few events where a Sr. National Record was not set. Everyone was slow.







Day Four

The 200 Medley Relay and the 200 Free Relay brought home ribbons. Linette teamed up with three other swimmers on-line. The four had never met until the day before the relay. Taking 6th place (out of 6) was good enough for some new friends to have a few parting memories of the 2022 National Senior Games held in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida.
